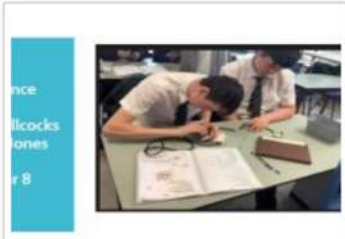
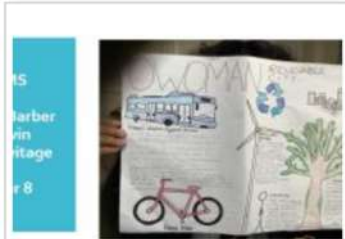

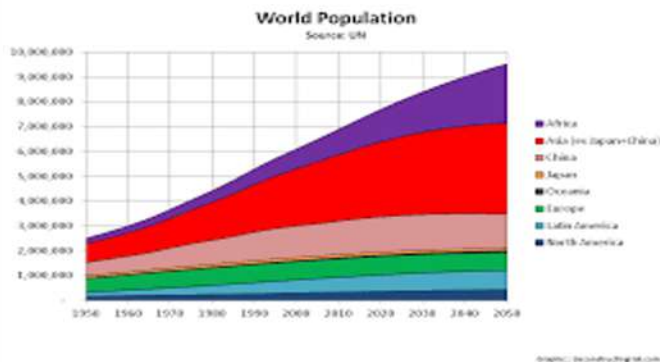

World Population Day (11th July 2022)



The recent past has seen enormous changes in fertility rates and life expectancy. In the early 1970s, women had on average 4.5 children each; by 2015, total fertility for the world had fallen to below 2.5 children per woman. Meanwhile, average global lifespans have risen, from 64.6 years in the early 1990s to 72.6 years in 2019.

In addition, the world is seeing high levels of urbanisation and accelerating migration. 2007 was the first year in which more people lived in urban areas than in rural areas, and by 2050 about 66 per cent of the world population will be living in cities

As the population of the World approaches 8 billion people

- Since the middle of the 20th century, the world has experienced unprecedented population growth. The world's population more than tripled in size between 1950 and 2020.
- The growth rate of the world's population reached a peak between 1965 and 1970, when human numbers were increasing by an average of 2.1% per year.
- During the period from 2000 to 2020, even though the global population grew at an average annual rate of 1.2%, 48 countries or areas grew at least twice as fast: these included 33 countries or areas in Africa and 12 in Asia.

These megatrends have far-reaching implications. They affect economic development, employment, income distribution, poverty and social protections.

They also affect efforts to ensure universal access to health care, education, housing, sanitation, water, food and energy. To more sustainably address the needs of individuals, policymakers must understand how many people are living on the planet, where they are, how old they are, and how many people will come after them.

Emmeline Pankhurst Day (14th July 2022)



Emmeline Pankhurst was born on 14 July 1858 in Moss Side, Manchester. Her family were very wealthy and her parents were both politically active. Her paternal grandfather was one of the protesting marchers demanding political reform at St Peter's Field in 1819 and narrowly escaped death in what became known as the **Peterloo Massacre**.

As she grew older, Emmeline's sense of injustice that women were treated **differently** to men motivated her to help change that. In 1903 she, along with her daughters Sylvia and Christabel, founded the **Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU)**.

WSPU members became the first women labelled as '**suffragettes**' (*a woman seeking the right to vote through organised protest*).

Members were known to smash windows, damage public property and even start fires. This got many women in trouble with the police and some even sentenced to time in prison, where they were treated very badly. When the stories of bad treatment reached the newspapers, it actually helped to increase support for the suffragette movement. In 1914 the First World War began. Emmeline Pankhurst encouraged WSPU members to put their demonstrations on hold, in order to focus on the war effort. Emmeline asked women to take up roles in factories in support of the men fighting. In response, the government released all WSPU prisoners.

When the war ended in 1918, the **Representation of the People Act** was introduced, giving women over the age of 30 who owned property, the right to vote.

Although Emmeline lived to see some women gain the right to vote, she died on 14 June 1928, just a few weeks before a law was passed giving all women over 21 years of age the right to vote.
