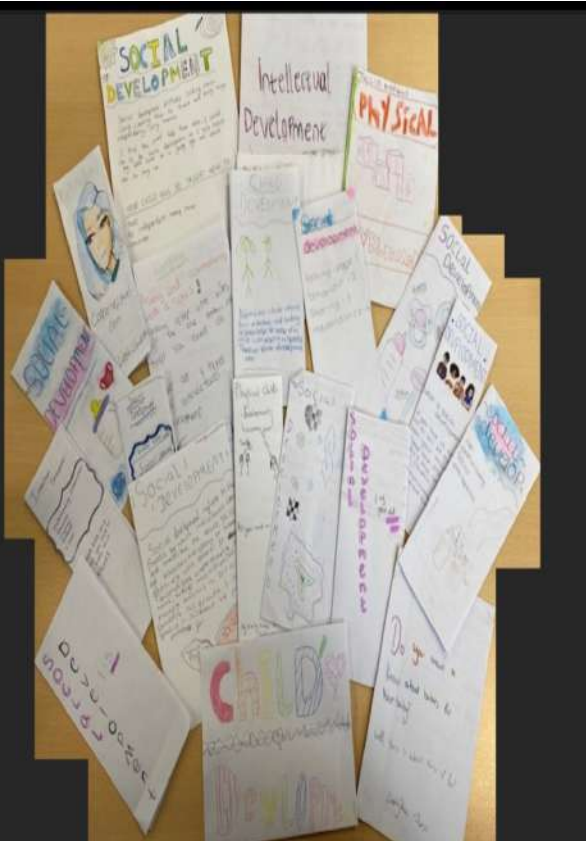

Uniform

Dear Parent/Carer

8th July 2024

We would like to take this opportunity to remind you of our school uniform policy. We expect high standards across all years in school and take great pride in the appearance of our pupils. First impressions are important and our school uniform is to be worn with pride. Part of our school values is to 'be prepared' and having the correct uniform and equipment will ensure that your child is effectively prepared for learning.

Here is an update regarding our sanctions:

- For genuine reasons, please inform our school office (that same morning) - phone calls or emails only and no letters/notes. They will then be issued a uniform card and reported to the Head of Year and Mrs. Waterhouse, who will then decide if isolation is still required.
- If no valid reason is given that morning, a conduct log will be issued and form teachers will report to Head of Year and Mrs. Waterhouse. **These pupils will be isolated with either form tutor, Head of Year, Key Stage Leader or even placed in the Quiet Room.**
- A weekly whole-school detention will then be issued where we have had no parent contact on the day of incorrect uniform (parent text will be sent on Fridays, with detentions after school on Tuesdays). For those who are persistent, Quiet Room time will be issued until uniform is corrected.

Please see below for a summary:

The uniform for the school includes:



- Black blazer with school badge. This should be worn at all times and can be taken off in lessons **only** if a member of staff allows it (for example, in hot weather). Coats, jackets, hoodies and jumpers are not to be worn around school.
- White shirt: It should be noted that this is a traditional shirt that buttons to the collar and is long enough to be tucked in (**shirts should be tucked in at all times**).
- A plain, black jumper (no logos) can be worn under the blazer
- School house tie
- Black trousers: Girls should note that the trousers must be of a formal, tailored style, i.e. **not fitted trousers, jeans or leggings**. We should not be able to see ankles! Tight fitting, Lycra trousers will not be allowed at all. Black socks are preferred.
- Skirts: Girls are allowed to wear a school skirt with a school logo, which can be purchased from the school shop. Skirts should be of appropriate length and not rolled over at the top. Black tights or black socks/knee high socks required.
- Black footwear (low-heel, no coloured logos, no additional colours on laces or soles). Footwear can be trainers as long as they are all black.
- Jewellery: For safety and security reasons, only one pair of sleeper or stud earrings may be worn in each earlobe. Pupils may wear a watch.
- In all cases, jewellery should be removed for safety reasons (PE, Technology). Where jewellery can't be removed or where it goes against the school policy (in the case of facial piercings), pupils will be made to wear plasters to cover until it can be removed.
- Hair should be of a natural colour – we are having an increase in coloured hair. Please ensure that our policy is adhered to. Pupils who do present themselves with a different colour hair (and go against policy) will have to wear hair up and will be monitored on a daily basis until it grows out.
- Eyelashes need to be natural (pupils will be asked to remove fake ones).
- Nail varnish and false nails are not allowed (for health and safety reasons).
- An apron is required for Technology.
- Air pods/wireless earphones are not allowed in lessons. Pupils will be asked that these are removed and, in some cases, will be confiscated.
- Using mobile phones in school is not permitted.

PE Kit

- Royal blue polo shirt, black shorts/black sports leggings/black jogging bottoms (NOT any other colour) and black socks.
- There is also the option of having a blue, long-sleeve jersey and a black waterproof sports jacket.
- PE Hoodies are available to buy.
- For outdoor field activities, boots, gum shield and shin pads are necessary for rugby, hockey and football.
- Trainers with non-marking soles for indoor use.
- Nike pro shorts are NOT allowed. Sport shorts must come to at least mid-thigh/just above the knee.
- Please read the PE FAQs and department policy for further information on if your child is unable to take part in PE lessons.

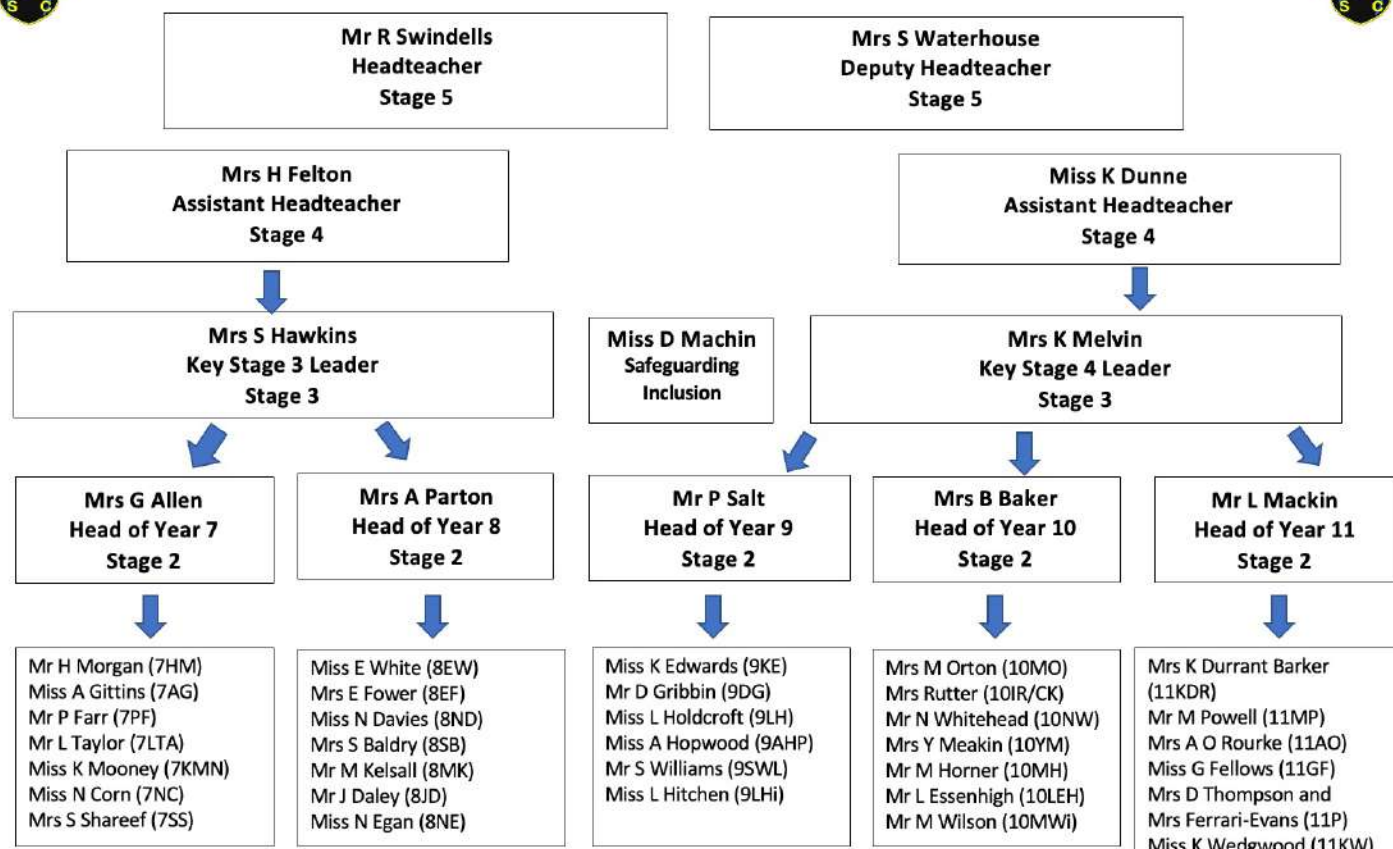

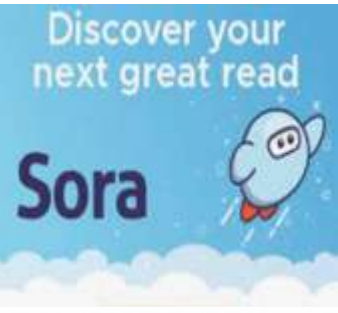

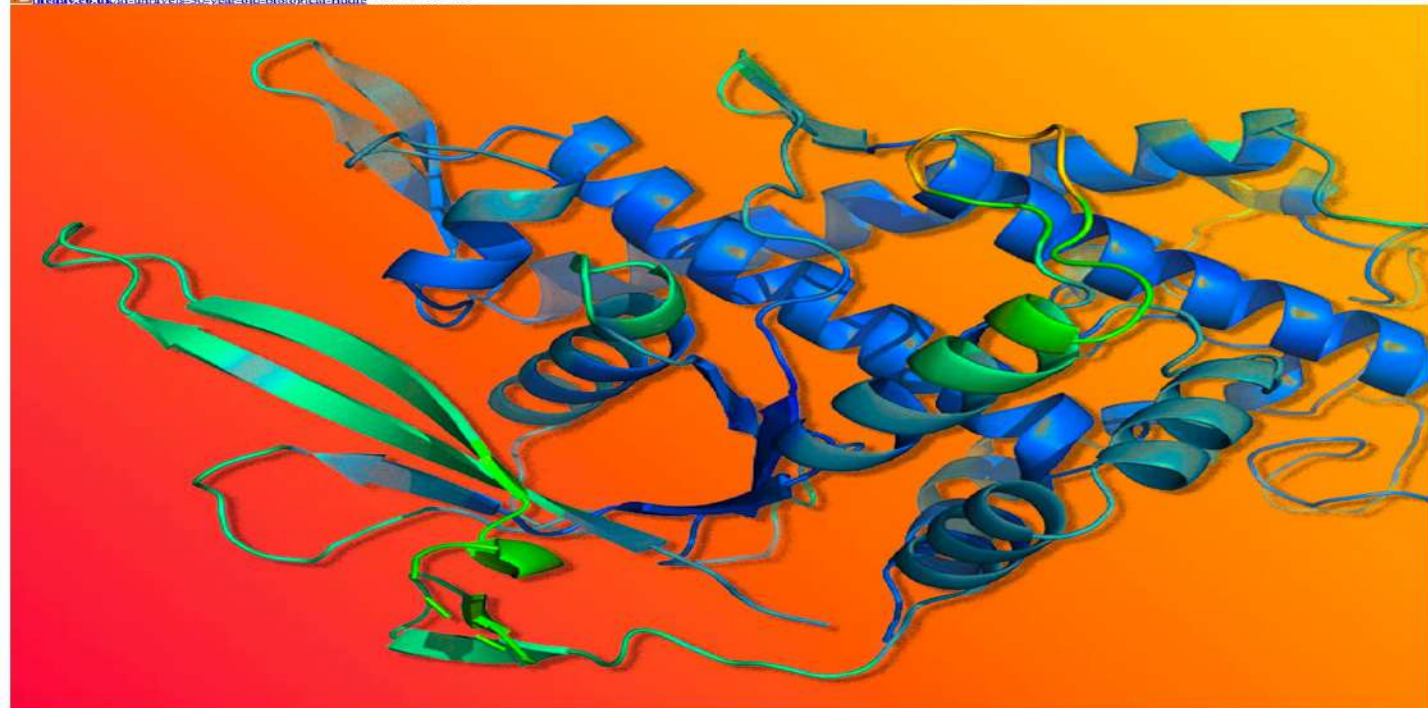

AI unravels 50-year-old biological riddle

Was this the most important news story of 2020? Researchers at DeepMind have made a mind-boggling discovery that could eradicate diseases and put the brakes on climate breakdown.

By 2 December 2030, the world's **landfill problem** might have been solved. Terrible illnesses like Alzheimer's and Parkinson's disease could be as much a thing of the past as smallpox and polio. And it will all be thanks to a scientific breakthrough unveiled on Monday.

It seems like a very small, technical achievement: the artificial intelligence group **DeepMind** has produced a programme, AlphaFold, that can reliably predict how **proteins** will fold. But it will revolutionise the way humanity lives.

All life is based on proteins, from the tiniest virus to the biggest, most complex creature. Being able to map proteins is the key to all kinds of revolutionary technologies.

We could produce "green enzymes" that safely break down plastic waste. We could predict and prevent cases of **neurodegenerative diseases** like Huntington's disease. We could even cure age-old illnesses like **malaria**, which has plagued humanity since the beginning of our history.

But what is protein folding, and why is it so important?

A gene is a long string of DNA molecules which are described using four letters: c, a, t and g. Three of these letters together make up an amino acid. If the molecules are like letters in a word, then amino acids are the words themselves.

But just knowing the "words" does not help us understand the proteins. Proteins are clumps of amino acids that are folded in particular ways, and these folds are like grammar: they determine the function of the protein in the same way that the order of words decides the meaning of a sentence.

The two sentences "the dog bites the man" and "the man bites the dog" have the same words, but very different meanings. In the same way, identical amino acids can produce very different proteins.

Genetic disorders are caused when a single DNA molecule is "misprinted" as another letter: a kind of genetic typo. This single, tiny mutation can alter the way in which a protein folds, with devastating effects on the body.

Previously, scientists could map out a protein. But they could not predict how a mutation would affect its shape, and thus its function. It is a problem that has plagued biology for five decades. Now they finally have a solution. It is like cracking the **Enigma** code in the fight against genetic disease.

Longer life expectancies across the world have come at a price: genetic disorders associated with old age – like Alzheimer's and Parkinson's – which occur when brain proteins fold in the wrong way. Now we have the key to living longer lives without the threat of brain degeneration.

The breakthrough is also a vindication for DeepMind, which has previously focused mostly on training AI to play games like chess and **Go**. This is the long-term strategy of the **Alphabet**-owned company: it has used games as a training ground for its AI, building them up to tackle more serious problems.

There is more work to be done: AlphaFold is not correct 100% of the time. But it suggests that AI does have an application in this vital area of science.

So, is this the most important story of 2020?

Protein shake

Absolutely, say some. This is a huge leap forward for science, with plenty of practical applications. Thanks to this discovery, the world could be unrecognisable by the beginning of the next decade. Whole diseases might have been wiped out, the oceans could be free of plastic, famine could be a thing of the past, and old age might no longer carry the threat of slow, agonising mental decline.

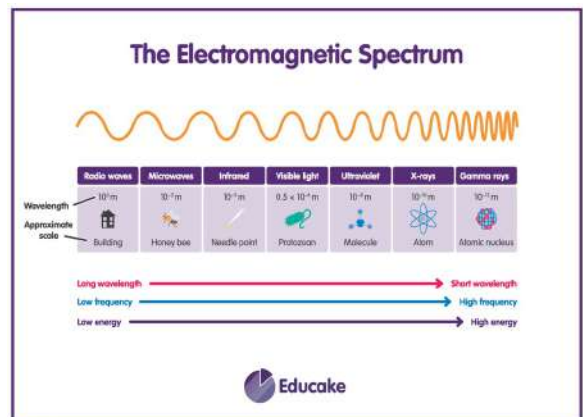
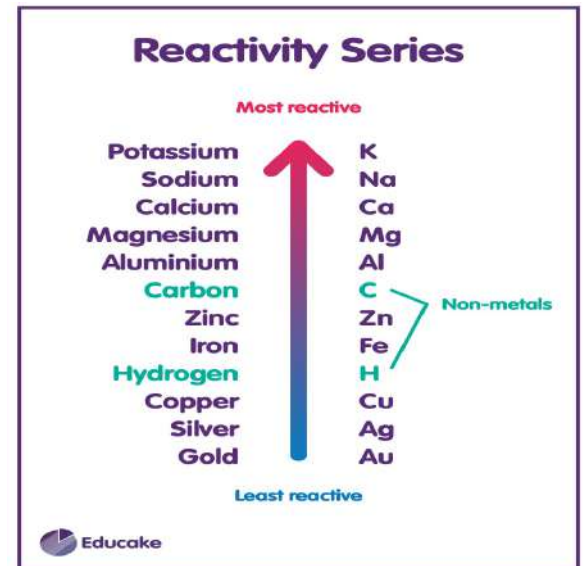
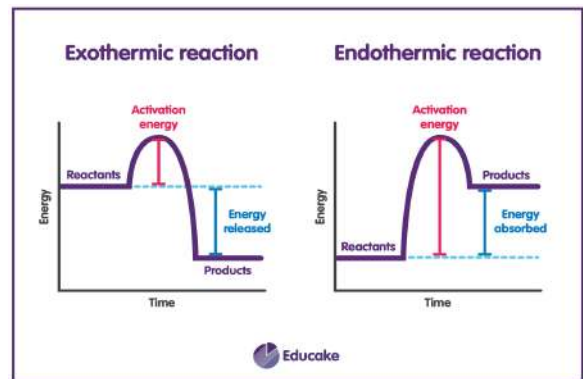

Magic trick of the week – read this!!!

35. Oldest Magic Tricks Ever Performed in History – part 1

1. The Fantastic Orange Tree Trick



Houdini made an egg disappear into a lemon and the lemon into the orange. He turned them to powder, mixed them with liquor, poured them on a tree, the tree sprouted real oranges, and the final orange opened to reveal the handkerchief and ring.

The trick was really a combination of rods, levers, and amazing mechanical props to bring the objects into view

2. Thumb Tie Effect



This trick involves using sleight of hand to create enough slack in a piece of rope so that, when tied, the magician can easily escape while playing up the effort required to do so.

3. Card on Ceiling



One of these tricks was a card on the ceiling, which he could make appear bearing the face of any card called for by the audience. His "dexterity of hand," as it was called, was a legendary feature of the Bartholomew Fair, which ran from 1133 to 1855 showing numerous public acts.

4. The Inexhaustible Bottle



This trick involved a bottle that could produce different drinks and continue to pour them even after being emptied. It is now a well-known prop trick, where a series of stoppers control the airflow in the bottle and allow the magician to pour from multiple pipes.
